DELIVERY AND COLLECTION:

We cannot make exception to the following times:

1. The Exhibition Pavilion is open from 1.30pm to 7.30pm on Wednesday 6th November to accept all art & craft exhibits. JUDGING DAY IS THURSDAY.
2. Horticulture to be delivered Friday, November 8th from 1 pm to 5pm (sharp).
3. When delivering exhibits, signage will be on the roadways leading to the Exhibition Pavilion. Alternatively, searching for "The Shed – Skate Victoria" on Google Maps will provide directions to the front door of the Exhibition Pavilion.
4. Articles will not be accepted, nor returned, by post.
5. All exhibits must remain on display during the show.
6. The Pavilion will close at 4pm on Sunday and exhibits are to be collected not earlier than 5.30pm until 6.30pm (excepting Schools, see STUDENT/SCHOOL SECTION).
7. Exhibitors must produce their portion of the entry form for identification when delivering and collecting exhibits.

RULES:

1. Stewards have the right to transfer any exhibit to its correct class if they believe it has been entered incorrectly.
2. Stewards take all care, but the Society does not accept responsibility for any damages/loss that may occur.
3. Judge's decision is final.
4. All articles are restricted to a reasonable size that must be able to be lifted by one person, unaided.
5. Sizes for articles if listed in the schedule must be observed.
6. OVERSIZE articles may be displayed but will NOT be judged.

NOVICE EXHIBITOR: A "Novice Exhibitor" is one who has not won a 1st Prize at any Agricultural Society Show in the same or similar class.

DIFFERING ABILITIES EXHIBITOR - classes for persons with differing needs.

PAYMENT OF ENTRIES

1. Stamps will not be accepted as payment of entries. Direct deposit to our account, cheque, or money order is preferred.
2. Cash payment preshow may be made to the office - correct money ONLY please - 10am-3pm Fridays (from BEGINNING OCTOBER).
3. Postal entries – a stamped-self-addressed envelope is required when submitting postal entries for return of exhibit tags.
4. Email entries – a \$2.50 administration fee is payable to cover postage for return of exhibit tags.
5. Late entries will be accepted on the day at double entry fee.

Rules and Regulations.

1. The entrant must follow the recipe and specifications provided below.
2. Each cake entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
3. Professionals are not eligible, which is defined as someone that works professionally or derives the greater percentage of their income in that craft, art form or technique.
4. The Rich Fruit Cake competition follows the three levels of competition: Show Level, Group Level and State Level.
5. An exhibitor having won at their local Show will bake another cake for the 2025 Group Final and then the winner of the Group Final will bake another cake for the State Final at the 2025 Melbourne Royal Show.

6. An exhibitor having won at Show Level is not eligible to enter the VAS Rich Fruit Cake Competition at any other show until after the Group Final judging.
7. An exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Group in the State Final.
8. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final Level, then the second placegetter is eligible to compete.
9. If an exhibitor is found to have won more than one Group Final the exhibitor must forfeit/refund all prizes and will be disqualified from exhibiting for 12 months.

Recipe

Ingredients – Preferred 100% Australian Grown Produce

- 250g sultanas
- 250g chopped raisins
- 250g currants
- 125g chopped mixed peel
- 90g chopped red glace cherries
- 90g chopped blanched almonds
- 1/3 cup sherry or brandy
- 250g plain flour
- 60g self-raising flour
- 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 250g butter
- 250g soft brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
- 1/2 teaspoon almond essence
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 4 large eggs

Method

Cut the fruit & almonds into 3-4 pieces and mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Recipe

Ingredients

- 375g plain flour
- 2tsp baking powder
- 1 ½ tsp bicarb soda
- 2tsp ground cinnamon
- ½ tsp ground nutmeg
- ½ tsp allspice
- Pinch of salt
- 345g castor sugar
- 350ml vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 3 medium carrots, grated (350 grams)
- 220g tin crushed pineapple, drained
- 180g pecan nuts coarsely crushed

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180C (160C fan), Grease a 23cm (9 inch) round cake tin and line with baking paper.
2. Sift the dry ingredients together into a bowl. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and oil, then add to the dry ingredients. Mix well then add the carrots, crushed pineapple and pecans. Mix to form a smooth batter and pour into the cake tin.
3. Bake for approximately 90 - 100 minutes.
4. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the tin on a wire rack. Upend and allow to cool on the wire rack.

HANDY HINTS

DECORATED SAUCER
